


The President Visits the Army: Jeff Davis at Chattanooga, October 1863

"It has pleased Almighty God to reward the valor and endurance of our troops by giving to our arms a complete victory over the enemy's superior numbers. Homage is due and is rendered unto Him who giveth not the battle to the strong. Soldiers, after two days of severe battle... you have stormed the barricades and breastworks of the enemy, and driven before you in confusion and disorder an army largely superior in numbers, and whose constant theme was your demoralization and whose constant boast was your defeat... We drop a soldier's tear upon the grave of the noble men who have fallen by our sides and move forward. Much has been accomplished. More remains to be done before we can enjoy the blessings of peace and freedom."

So Braxton Bragg proclaimed to his troops in the heady days following their victory at Chickamauga. But this public statement of determination and encouragement hid a very important fact. Dissension among the Army of Tennessee leaders was rampant and had only worsened following the battle in the valley of the River of Death. Bragg and his senior subordinates were at each other's throats, and now there were new players in the fight. The situation was so bad that the President of the Confederate States of America felt compelled to leave his sick bed to come to the army to try to resolve it. It was not Jefferson Davis's first visit to the army, but this one portended more. Much more. The ramifications of it would play out six weeks later in the shadow of Lookout Mountain and on the slopes of Missionary Ridge. Come join us as Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park Historian Jim Ogden examines the reasons for Davis's visit to the Army of Tennessee and explores how both the officers and men of the army viewed the chief executive's visit, their expectations both real and imagined, and how they saw its outcome.

The story was compelling and we thank Brian and Linda Gottfried for bringing it to us.

The last activity that the KCWRT was involved with in November was to apply for a Civil War Roundtable Congress (CWRTC) grant. They sponsored three different categories of grants with two \$250 awards per category. Our director of membership, Bill Nicolai, led the charge on applying for the grant in the History Research Initiative. As it turned out, we won. The grant will go towards signage that will be placed on Armstrong Hill. So, I guess we can say we were nationally recognized again. Our thanks to Bill in seeing it through.

The membership meeting was where we also learned about the possibilities in front of us. That came in listening to our two invited guests: Warren Dockter, the president and CEO of the East Tennessee Historical Society and

WELCOME BACK TO KNOXVILLE, JIM OGDEN!



Jim Ogden, Chief Historian at Chickamauga and Chattanooga National Military Park, is a historian, teacher, and tour guide par excellence. A frequent speaker at Round Tables and historical organizations across the U.S., Jim is a longtime friend of the KCWRT, our most visited speaker, and the first historian to be awarded with an honorary lifetime membership to our organization. A native of St. Mary's County, Maryland, Jim joined the National Park Service in 1982 and served at Chickamauga and Chattanooga, Russell Cave, and Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania before returning to Chickamauga and Chattanooga NMP in 1988 as historian, the position he now holds. Jim has taught numerous history courses, led hundreds of tours

and army staff rides, and written several articles on the Civil War. He also has appeared in several TV productions including "Civil War Journal," "Civil War Combat," and "History Detectives." Over the years Jim has been the recipient of a host of awards for his scholarship, preservation and advocacy work. His most recent awards include the United States Army Commander's Award for Public Service and the Civil War Trust's National Park Service Preservation Advocate Award. Jim, his wife Lora, and their son Jamie (born on the 133rd anniversary of the Battle of Fredericksburg) live in Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia near the Chickamauga Battlefield.
